You've probably heard the term youth disengagement before. Why? Because it's a problem that's increasingly affecting youth in communities across Australia. It negatively impacts school attendance, mental health, educational outcomes and career opportunities for many teens. Unfortunately, trends show that the rates are even higher than average for Indigenous youths.

The catalysts for disengagement are complex and varied. However, much of it is related to mental health stemming from intergenerational trauma, lack of familial support, troubled home environments and peer and societal pressures.

The impacts on individuals are diverse but similarly heartbreaking. We have personally witnessed the aftermath of youth disengagement from community, family and education. Too many times, we have borne witness to the consequences of lost confidence, lost self-respect and missed opportunities. So, we made a commitment to changing this narrative for underrepresented and disadvantaged youth, and to play an active role in helping them take control of their future.

Our Experiences Shaped Our Mission

While working on a 3.5 million acre station in Western Australia's Kimberly region, I (Jason) was involved in leading a youth development program aimed at tackling youth disengagement. In the 5 years that I was involved in that youth program I witnessed first-hand the positive effects that nurture and opportunity had on Indigenous youths. Through hands-on traineeships, these young people developed job-ready skills, leadership, confidence, mindfulness and a realistic approach to ongoing employment.

In 2015, we moved to Tamworth and took on operations at Swamp Oak Station. Recognising growing issues for young people in our community, we searched for a similar program to help engage our local youth. With no luck finding anything on the east coast, we committed to creating our own program, modelled on the successful WA model.

The positive impacts of equine-assisted learning and development are well-document. Professor Juli Coffin of the Telethon Kids Institute works with children in Indigenous communities in Western Australia and has conducted extensive research into the healing power of horses. Prof. Coffin recently noted, "To date, traditional Western-based programs aiming to increase wellbeing among Aboriginal young people have had limited effectiveness at engaging at-risk Aboriginal youth. Aboriginal youth may not access mental health services in Australia due to a lack of culturally secure programs, with existing services being unsuitable to their needs." However, her research has shown that equine-assisted learning "offers opportunities to identify and strengthen leadership skills, and build participants' capacity and confidence to communicate and influence others."

At Swamp Oak Station, we have developed a 9-week program aimed at addressing the needs of young people who need support with both emotional and tangible life skills. Our mission is to boost attendees' confidence, encourage mindfulness, and create employment pathways. We know this will provide a long-lasting and ongoing benefit to participants, their families and the community as a whole. We've been around horses our entire lives, and we're aware of the therapeutic benefits they have on those who work with them. Our desire is share our experience and our resources (our horses) with young people to empower and inspire them to take control of their own future.

Empowering & Inspiring Youth

The Youth Agriculture and Equine Development Program at Swamp Oak Station is a holistic approach to Indigenous youth disengagement, that fosters well-being for Indigenous youth through outdoor education and connection to Country. The program is designed to empower young people through a combination of increased self-awareness and self-determination, teamwork, and equine leadership.

Mental health challenges are the source of many of today's underlying youth issues. Our program is designed to assist participants to recognise their emotions and develop mechanisms to navigate through obstacles.

Research studies into the extensive benefits of equine-assisted therapy have proven its effectiveness in assisting individuals to develop a work ethic, learn how to trust, and to identify and process feelings. Through connection to our horses and developing horsemanship skills, program participants will learn essential emotional, psychological, and social well-being skills. Additionally, students develop equine management skills and boosted confidence, resulting in more positive scholastic outcomes and future employment pathways.

Pilot Program Results

During Term 2, 2021, nine [9] Aboriginal students from Gunnedah High School completed the nine-week pilot Youth Agriculture and Equine Development Program at Swamp Oak Station. The program continues to be highly praised by school leaders, school-based mental health professionals and the local community for increasing participants' school attendance and reengaging the students in their studies and the community.

"[Before the program] I wasn't interested in being involved with horses or doing the program. But after the first week of the program, I couldn't wait to get back out to Swamp Oak again. Our Vision

Following the resounding success of the pilot, we are aiming to extend the reach and impact of the program by creating opportunities for more youths to participate.

Our goal is to conduct five (5) programs of 10 students per school term, to change the narrative of another 150 students before the end of July, 2022.

At a cost of \$2,000 per student (per 9-week program), we are seeking to raise \$300K of support to enable Swamp Oak Station to reach this for the young people in our community over the next 3 school terms.



Program Overview

- Swamp Oak Station is a working cattle property located on Kamilaroi/Gomeroi Country, 27km east of Tamworth, NSW
- The 9-week Youth Agriculture and Equine Development program is conducted during school hours for one day per week across a full school term
- The target participants are 14–16-year-old males and females, Indigenous and non-Indigenous students from local high schools and in juvenile justice programs
- The program has a strict "No school, no horse riding" rule
- · Each 'cohort' can accommodate 10 students

The cost of the 9-week program is \$2000/student

Skills Learned

Through participation in the Youth Agriculture and Equine Development Program at Swamp Oak Station, students will have fun, challenge themselves and build strong personal and employment skills for the future.

From beginning to end each participant will experience the same program; however, as they navigate their way through their learning, they will each embark on their own unique journey.

Resilience and Social Foundations for Life

- · Teamwork, communication, and interpersonal skills
- · Resilience and ability to adapt to change
- · Listening and understanding
- · Identifying non-verbal cues
- It's okay to make mistakes, try again
- · Boosting confidence and self-esteem
- Self-respect and respect for others
- Understand the impacts they have on those around them

Equine-assisted Therapy for Mindfulness

With guidance, each student participant will be taught how to connect with the horse safely. Horses will give students immediate emotional feedback, helping them to become aware of the impact they have on those around them. Working with the horses offers youths opportunities to practise new ways of relating to others without judgement or criticism. Connection with our horses also allows participants to:

- · Work through immediate feelings;
- · Be mindful of their actions and body language;
- · Calm their worries and anxieties;
- · Become stronger communicators; and
- · Find success through persistent effort.

Horsemanship Skills for Employment Pathways

Swamp Oak Station's Youth Agriculture and Equine Development Program equips youth participants with the essential horsemanship skills required for the start of a possible rural career as a jackaroo or jillaroo. Our team is able to share their wealth of experience with disengaged teenagers building essential equine skills such as:

- · How to safely approach and catch a horse;
- · Correct grooming techniques;
- Tethering a horse and a variety of quick-release knotting methods;
- · Mount and ride a trail horse; and
- [if the opportunity arises] Fully tack a horse.
